

#### **Dress Guideline Forum Community Report**

We have asked the question and you have responded with enthusiasm and passion as a community. Since April 11<sup>th</sup>, 2019 staff, parents, grandparents, caregivers and members of the community have provided feedback regarding their considerations as we review dress guideline for the Chilliwack school district.

Thanks to your participation in our online platform called ThoughtExchange, we saw 1269 participants share 1275 thoughts from April 11 to April 30. ThoughtExchange allows us to uncover opposing priorities in the conversation, identify gaps in perception, build on areas of agreement among various groups, and discern key themes to understand what's important to our whole Chilliwack community. We want to take this opportunity to thank you for taking the time to share your thoughts as we collectively work towards co-creating a dress guideline that supports student success in Chilliwack Schools.

This summary report was shared with members of the <u>Education Policy Advisory Committee</u> at their meeting on May 2nd, 2019. The role of the Education Policy Advisory Committee is to review all of the new policy ideas and existing policy changes and make recommendations to the Board of Education at a future meeting. As part of completing the conversation, the summary report is also shared with the community for consistency, clarity.


Here is the summary of the results:


